Highlights from the 2019 Fall ACS National meeting:

- 1. As of Tuesday, August 27th, the total San Diego meeting attendance was **12,409**.
- 2. On the recommendation of the Committee on Budget and Finance, the ACS Board of Directors voted to set the advance member registration fee for national meetings held in 2020 at \$505 this amount is equal to the 2019 fee, adjusted for inflation.
- 3. The Committee on Nominations and Elections: Ballots for the 2019 fall national election will be distributed starting on September 30th, with a voting deadline four weeks later on October 25th. All members are encouraged to vote for President-Elect and the Constitutional Amendment.


